Catalog description: The application of basic principles of interpersonal communication with emphasis on the affective dimensions. Attention is given to using basic counseling strategies and psychological techniques as an aid to effective communication.

Etiquette and Netiquette Expectations: All students are expected to follow rules of common courtesy in the classroom, in all email messages, and in online discussions.

- **Be professional** at all times. You are preparing yourself to be a career professional. Remember this as you establish your online presence.
- **Be respectful** of other people. Everyone is entitled to his or her own opinion. While it is okay to disagree, please do so with respect to others.
- **Be calm**. If you are upset or frustrated, keep this out of your communications with your fellow students or instructors. An angry or sarcastic comment does little to win respect or cooperation. Think about what you are going to say in an unemotional, professional manner. Provide adequate information when asking for help or assistance from your instructors or classmates.

- **Humor and sarcasm**. Because there are no visual cues in distance education, humor and sarcasm are nearly impossible to discern. Be very careful when interjecting humor and refrain from using any remarks that are sarcastic in nature.
- Harassment and other offensive behavior. The online learning environment is no place to
 harass, threaten, or embarrass others. Comments that can be viewed as offensive, sexist, or
 racist will not be tolerated. It is never appropriate to put anyone down because of his or her age,
 race, religion, color, sex, or sexual preference. The instructor may deem it necessary to remove
 any such online postings or discussions.
- Offensive material. Students may not post, transmit, promote, or distribute content that is
 racially, religiously, or ethnically offensive or is harmful, abusive, vulgar, sexually explicit,
 otherwise potentially offensive.
- Capital letters and bolding. In written communication, the use of capital letters and/or bolding
 is used for emphasis. In much of the corporate world, writing in all caps is considered yelling.
 Yelling is not tolerated in a residential classroom and, therefore, is not acceptable in any online
 communications with students.

This syllabus represents my current plans and objectives. As we go through the semester, those plans may need to change to enhance the class learning opportunity. However, such changes will be clearly communicated to all students in class and through online announcements on Canvas.

Course Structure:

Course Descriptions and Objectives: This course's main purpose is to enhance your knowledge of communication principles, which in turn leads to improving your skills in perceiving others, interacting with people, and overcoming communication barriers. Both the emotional and cognitive components of communication will be discussed. During this course, we will explore our own communication patterns and how others perceive what we express to them.

<u>Grades are earned by successful completion of the following activities:</u> 100 points - Class participation and attendance.

These points are determined by attendance, preparedness, and participation. You are expected to read each assigned chapter and to show up on time to class prepared to engage in class discussions. Most classes will consist of lectures, discussions, and experiential activities. Respectful and professional interactions with others are a component of your participation grade. Please revisit the etiquette section of this syllabus if you have questions regarding respectful and professional behavior, or feel free to talk to me about questions or concerns.

100 points – Journal Assignments.

You will be expected to complete a 1-2 page journal assignment each week. Please discuss what you have learned from both the textbook and the classroom discussions. These journals will be worth ten points each, for a total of 100 points. The journals will be graded based on your ability to: a) think critically about the information, b) synthesize information across chapters and discussions, and c) discuss how the information learned can have an impact on your professional and personal life. I do not expect you to share any personal information that you are not comfortable sharing; therefore, your level of sharing personal information will not be a factor in grading.

100 points – Discussion Facilitation

By the second week of class, you will form three groups. Your group will develop and lead three class discussions lasting approximately 30 minutes each. These discussions will be based on the reading assignment for that week. You can incorporate media into your discussion, such as video clips, song clips, or passages from a book or article; however, this use of media will be to add to your discussion,

not to replace it. You will be expected to be prepared with questions for your classmates that will serve as prompts for your discussion. The first class discussion will be facilitated by the instructor so that you have an idea of what is expected.

100 points – Final Presentation:

In groups of two or three, you will present on a topic of your choice concerning communication. You can keep the same groups that you used for the discussion facilitation assignments, or you can form new groups. The presentation should include a handout, a class participation activity, a thorough discussion of your topic, and your perspectives of this topic. You will be required to discuss your presentation with the instructor at least two weeks before you present. You are encouraged to be creative with this assignment and to incorporate multiple different communication strategies that we have learned. Some examples could be communication via art, music, poetry, phone apps, etc. You can elaborate on a topic that we have covered, or you can present on a topic that was missing from the textbook.

100 points - Final Exam

The final exam will be a cumulative multiple choice exam. The final exam schedule can be found on the registrar's website. Please check your UF email and Canvas account for updates throughout the time of the course.

Time management is crucial to your academic success, so be prepared to create a schedule that works for you and stick to it. **Please note that NO late work will be accepted.** However, I understand that life happens. Should you find yourself not able to meet a deadline, please contact me prior to the deadline, so that we can discuss a resolution.
